Traditional music often has a strong sense of place. All the placenames in red have links with tunes on this CD.

BORDERBOX

Northumberland is one area of England where traditional music has survived despite all the competing influences and attractions of the modern world. The purpose of BorderBox has been to nurture this tradition by enabling and encouraging young musicians to learn the traditional styles, techniques and repertoire of country dance bands from Northumberland and the Borders.

The BorderBox sound is based on the classic traditional music combination of fiddle and accordion, together with the standard country dance band rhythm section of second accordion, piano, bass and drums.

The young fiddlers and accordionists of BorderBox play jigs, reels, marches, hornpipes and waltzes with great vitality and a tremendous lilt. They also show that they can handle slow airs with sensitivity and feeling.

BACKGROUND

In 2000 the arts organisation, Folkworks, began to assemble instruments, teachers and funding for projects to promote the teaching of traditional music in schools in the North of England. The eventual outcome of one of those projects was the formation of BorderBox, a band for young musicians throughout Northumberland who came together once or twice a year to rehearse and perform. In 2004 the band increased its activities with a move to monthly rehearsals, external funding, a parents' committee with a formal constitution and even a "Sunday name" (*The Border Box and Fiddle Youth Band*). In recent years the band has won all the band competitions in the local traditional music festivals at Alnwick, Morpeth and Rothbury.

COMPANION TUNES

To encourage the participation of young players at varying levels of experience and development, the band arrangements have always included the use of second or even third harmony lines. This eventually led to the concept of "companion tunes", i.e. different tunes which can be played either individually or in harmony with each other. Some examples of companion tunes on this CD include "Harbottle Crag" and "Whittingham Tower", "Linhope House" and "The King of The Fairies", "Up The Berwick Road" and "The Spittal March".

NB: Risty Gulley (the first of the old Northumbrian 3/2 hornpipes in Set 4) is not a misspelling. It is an old name for a carving knife although it is often, perhaps through the influence of folk etymology, converted into "rusty gulley". The interesting hythm of the tune arises because alternate bars are played as three groups of two crotchets and then as two groups of three crotchets.
